

#### Cycle Network Program in Jeopardy

The Cycling Network Program (CNP) is a \$2 million per year cost sharing program that has significant improved cycling facilities in many of the communities in the Lower Mainland.

These improvements have increased the numbers of people cycling while reducing cycling accidents. Regular exercise such as cycling can dramatically improve people's health thus saving the government money.

As in all provincial government programs, the Cycling Network Program (CNP) is under review.

Given the great benefits of the CNP and its low level of funding, the province would be wise to increase funding for cycling, not decrease it.



#### ....and a little history lesson, pertaining to the E&N

By Pacific Rainforest Adventures We've been getting a lot of questions regarding "private forest lands" so here is a very brief history about the "private land issue". In 1886 a consortium of businessmen, headed by Robert Dunsmuir, completed a railway from Esquimalt to Nanaimo. The Provincial Gov't of theday gave them \$750,000.00 and 8000 square kilometers of land on the east side of Vancouver Island (about 1/5 of the entire Island) see attached map, the light shade is the land grant. In 1905 Dunsmuir was Premier of B.C. and he sold the railway and the land to the CPR. The C.P.R. subsequently sold parcels of the land to B.C. Forest companies. In recent years the majority of the lands have been bought by Weyerhaeuser (U.S. based, largestForest Company in the world) and imberWest (Australian ownedby Fletcher Challenge). At the same time

these two companies also bought tree Farm Licenses that are long term licenses on the majority of "crown land" on the rest of the Island and huge areas on the Mainland. The E. & N. Railwayisnow owned RailAmerica, Florida based Company. This is a very condensed version of how it happened that Cathedral Grove is now owned by Weyerhaeuser.
